

UK MATHS JUNIOR CHALLENGE

The UK Maths Trust is the leading charity that advances the education of young people in maths and for over 20 years has been inspiring a love of problem solving through maths challenges and enrichment activities.

On Thursday 25th April 2024, we entered 39 of our best mathematicians from Year 7 and Year 8 for the Junior Mathematics Challenge organised by UKMT and the results are in!

Of the 39 entries, we achieved 21 certificates!

Year 8 achieved 10 out of 20 certificates:

- Irina Florea achieved Silver and was Best in the Year!
- Luka Denes and Zarifa Zauari also achieved Silver certificates
- Bronze certificates for Ryley English, Harleen Grewal, Amina Hassan, Wasim Hussein, Tawfeeq Jaffar, Omar Mohamed and Zahra Sultani

Year 7 achieved an impressive 11 out of 19 certificates:

YEAR 10: THE INVENTOR

This week our inventors have continued to focus on becoming Year 11 ready as they prepare to embark on the next stage of their seven-year journey as the architects. In tutor time, students have been focusing on their post 16 options by exploring the different pathways available to them including sixth form, colleges and apprenticeships. It has been pleasing to see the mature conversations that have been happening around this. Our inventors will start to apply for these within the first term of Year 11, and therefore it is important that they make informed decisions that will enable them to carve the pathway to a successful future.

Within their curriculums, students are engaged with powerful knowledge in each subject and are practicing the application to exam questions. It is now evident from my learning walks that this is becoming habitual in classrooms and our students are taking great steps to becoming exam ready. Our inventors should now start to identify gaps in their knowledge and take accountability for their own learning by having conversations with staff around their progress and what they can be doing to be ready for Year 11 and address misconceptions.

Attendance continues to be a key focus, and we would like to thank parents and carers for their continued support in ensuring that students are attending school each day and are arriving promptly for their 8:40 start. Students who have above 95% attendance achieve on average half a grade more than their peers.

Eton College Visit



As part of our collaboration with Eton College, a group of our Year 11 Post 16 Select applicants enjoyed a day visit to Eton on personal development and future planning. It was certainly a day to remember and Maya, one of our Year 11 has eloquently outlined the experience here:

On the 22nd of April, my peers and I, from year 11, went on a trip to Eton College, where we experienced a variety of different engaging activities, such as critical thinking and self-leadership sessions.




We began with a tour around the historic sights of the school; for example, we saw the first ever classroom from the 1400s and the chapel, with grand features and historical paintings. Then we partook in several different interactive lectures with different teachers from Eton College. Following the tour, we had a session with Mr Noakes, who gave an insightful perspective on self-leadership and the importance of taking responsibility, for example, having a plan for your own future.



This session was followed by a debate led by Mr Soars, encouraging critical thinking to show our different perspectives, whilst encouraging open-mindedness. Later, we had the opportunity to speak to some Eton students, where we could ask about their day-to-day lives and their experience at Eton. After that, we had a Career Education session with Mr Fussey, where we received advice regarding our future decisions, discussing the importance of experience, and good qualities as a student. We ended our trip with a session about University Applications with Mr Smith, where we discussed good combinations of A-Level choices and the right career and university path for ourselves.
