We would like to thank all parents and carers who attended parents evening on Tuesday. It was fantastic to see so many productive conversations between teachers, parents and students around teaching and learning and revision. There are only 7 more school weeks until the next set of mock exams, and it is imperative that students continue with their revision routines outside of school. This coupled with the hard work going on inside of the classrooms and after-school interventions will help to ensure that they make the expected progress in the upcoming set of mocks. Students have been focusing on 'marginal gains' in each subject and looking at how they can be 1% better every day.

Interventions continue this week. This is a crucial time for Year 11, and it is important that they do not miss school, lessons and intervention classes. Attendance continues to be a key focus, and we would like to thank parents and carers for their continued support in ensuring that students are attending school each day and are arriving promptly. During tutor time, students will be receiving further intervention sessions Monday-Wednesday and then a personal development session on Thursday with an assembly on Fridays. Students who have above 95% attendance achieve on average half a grade more than their peers.

We will be revealing the winner of our 10-day attendance challenge at the end of the week, where all students who have been in school every day from Monday 30th September to Friday 11th October will be entered into a prize draw to receive a discount on their prom ticket.

POST 16: THE SCHOLAR

An excellent week in Post 16, this week as we move towards the end of a successful half term. Our year 13 have completed their personal statements for their Post 18 pathway choices. Some will take the traditional University route, while others are beginning to research Degree Apprenticeships and other more specialised journeys into their chosen careers. To assist with the UCAS application we will be welcoming Warwick University back to give a talk to our year 13 on Post 18 Finance, removing the myth that can exist around this issue. 
COVENTRY SCHOOL'S CROSS COUNTRY 2024

Blackman's ground-breaking, award winning books chart the lives and loves of generations as they takes on race and equality with breathtaking drama and heart wrenching sadness.

Set in an alternate reality, where the inferior Noughts live as second class citizens in a world run by Crosses, the four books explore the violent politics of a unstable world, and the ordinary lives caught up in in its terror.
